

## It's Time to End the Death Penalty in Santa Clara County

## What you don't know about the death penalty may surprise you.

Most people are surprised to learn that sentencing someone to execution costs a county far more than permanent incarceration. A recent report found that a trial seeking execution in California costs at least \$1.1 million *more* than a trial seeking permanent imprisonment, also called "life without parole." <sup>1</sup>

- Many people are also unaware that the death penalty costs the state millions more than permanent imprisonment. The California Commission on the Fair Administration of Justice found that housing and processing appeals for all those on death row costs California taxpayers \$137 million each year. If all 680 inmates were sentenced to permanent imprisonment instead of execution, it would only cost \$11 million each year, a savings of \$128 million.
- Some people are also surprised to learn that since 1973, 135 people have been freed from death row in this country based on evidence that they were in fact innocent. The conviction of innocent people and other problems with the death penalty have led a majority of nations, most major religions, and now 15 states in the U.S. to reject the death penalty. The District Attorney in San Francisco has rejected the death penalty in favor of other alternatives, allowing her to invest in proven violence prevention programs.

## Now that we know, what should we do? Pass a Resolution!

The Santa Clara County Coalition for Alternatives to the Death Penalty asks organizations, religious congregations and community groups to adopt a resolution calling for:

- 1) The District Attorney of Santa Clara County to pursue alternatives to the death penalty; and
- 2) The District Attorney and the Board of Supervisors of Santa Clara County to reprioritize the use of their limited resources in order to solve homicides, prevent violence and implement effective public safety programs.

Attached is a draft resolution, which will also be published on the website. The reasons for adopting the resolution may vary for each group. Thus, groups may modify the preamble ("whereas" statements). We ask that each resolution call for the two solutions stated above.

The Coalition will gather these resolutions to present to county officials. By adopting a resolution, you will be adding your group's voice to the call for change in policy on this critical issue.
